A dog's behavior may change based on surroundings, training, medical, socialization, and life experiences.

Hazy A5769560 (Intact) was initially avoidant as she scurried to the rear when the runner arrived. The kennel divider was lowered to prevent further escaping. With some coaxing, Hazy's body softened with a gentle tail wag, allowing herself to be leashed without issue. She exited the kennel on her own and proceeded to walk alongside the runner, bypassing her neighboring kennels. Inside the catch pen, she stood calmly during collar and leash placement. Hazy was allowed into the yard, where she showed no interest in the other dogs, preferring to explore the environment. She allowed herself to be petted by the handlers, though she appeared timid during the interaction. Hazy eventually approached and sniffed the other dogs, though she showed no initiative to engage in play with them. For the remainder of the session, she coexisted peacefully in the yard, preferring to keep to herself. Once the session concluded, she remained in the yard to begin her handling assessment. Hazy could benefit from continued socialization in a yard with calm dogs, as this may allow her to interact at her own comfort level and gradually develop her social skills.

Hazy A5769560 (Intact) was in the yard prior to the assessment. The handler was able to conduct a full evaluation without incident; however, Hazy appeared uncomfortable during the process. She displayed a tense posture, with a concerned gaze, a low tail, ears slightly back, and a closed mouth with occasional lip licking as her ears, mouth, abdomen, tail, and legs were handled. Her main concern became apparent when her legs were examined, as this caused her to turn toward the handler without escalating. Once the session concluded, she was allowed to return to the yard. Hazy was eventually returned to her kennel without issue. Due to her timid nature, Hazy could benefit from confidence-building training and slow introductions to help her gradually become comfortable with people.
